Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God.

-1 Corinthians 15:8-9

For the last month we have been practicing a mustard seed movement towards smallness, trying to notice the ways that the Gospel of Love is often less about the brightest and greatest, and more about the least and the last. From a tiny baby in a simple manger at Christmas, to the pinprick light of a single star on Epiphany; from a small family wedding to a very short sermon, we have been taking a subcompact micra ride into the ordinary nouns and verbs of our daily lives, only to discover those are the very places where love is born.

As we continue to reflect on these ideas, I am wondering how we connect them to our vision for the church. When we say out loud every week that we are called to make real relationships without agenda, part of what we are saying is that we want to be delivered from the delusion that our main goal in the church is to grow, or that our primary measure of success is attendance or giving or how we stack up against some other church. These capitalist tendencies can creep in and become an agenda for us, often without us even realizing it.

I wonder what the Gospel of Small Things has to say about this?

Early in Jesus' ministry we read about the people Jesus invited to follow him as his inner circle. If Jesus were trying to build a movement with measurable successes and marketable branding, we might imagine that he would select well-known folks, with reputable character and a circle of influence. Instead, Jesus chooses blue-collar, rough-around-the-edges fishermen. He chooses everyday people, leading what some might call "small" lives. Later in the story of the Church, when Paul is writing to some of the earliest Christians, he remarks that he is the very last of them all, because he had been one who had tried to persecute and kill Christ-followers. What kind of movement decides to take its biggest enemy and try to make him its spokesperson?

Friends, the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the good news of a Love that is stronger than death and that calls every single one of us beloved, is not as interested as we are in what the world would call successful, popular, or great. Time and time again God shows us that God is not interested in the size or success of things, but in the heart of them. God shows up in vulnerability as a tiny baby; God invites everyday people like you and I to be the church, not as salespeople for the next big thing, but as those who are called children of God. As we move through the rest of this winter, let us keep looking for ways we might be faithful to this invitation; for in the end, it is no small thing to be on this journey together.








Church Notes & Opportunities A Book for Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5. This year for our Lenten journey, we will be using Barbara Brown Taylor's book, An Altar in the World, as our companion text. The pastors will be using parts of this book each week in worship, and we would encourage your group to read through it during Lent, whether as a Sunday School class, a small group discussion, a couple friends meeting for coffee, or even on your own. An Altar in the World helps us to think beyond the typical spiritual practices we may feel obligated to try (and often inevitably fail at) during Lent. Taylor helps us to notice how the ordinary parts of our lives - the things we do to be alive – like walking, seeing, encountering others, and working, are actually spiritual practices that can help us encounter God in our lives.

Church-Wide Advent Art Project

In December of 2024, the people of St. Paul's United Methodist Church and Wesley Foundation once again collaborated on an art project. The Advent-themed blue and purple background of this piece, along with the word "With" was painted first, and then it was disassembled into 30 separate strips of wood. Each strip was given to a group of 2 or 3 people who didn't know one another well, who were invited to paint some sort of pattern or design on their strip. The practice here was not only to paint, but to create with one another, as a way of embodying our Advent journey. As we took the weeks of Advent in the growing darkness to remember that God's way of being is being with us (Emmanuel!), we also learned that one of the ways we can practice this is by being with one another, and that when we are, we find that, indeed, *God is with us*. 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Life After Loss

St. Paul's UMC & Wesley Foundation will be offering Life After Loss, an educational support group designed for persons grieving the loss of a loved one through death. This course is recommended for adults, 18 years and up, who are experiencing a loss by death that occurred at least 3 months prior to the first session. Materials used for guiding the sessions are from hospice-recommended resources and cover the following:

- Introduction and Loss History
- Normal Grief Process
- Depression and Anger
- Guilt and Forgiveness
- Letting Go and Saying Goodbye
- Taking Care of Yourself New Beginnings

This 6-week seminar will be held on Sundays:



Support Fair Trade Coffee Co-op at Abba Java

Last year for Spring Break, students from the Wesley Foundation, along with students from State College Presbyterian, traveled to the US/Mexico border in Douglas, AZ, and Agua Prieta, Mexico. In this border community, we partnered with Frontera de Cristo, a Presbyterian border ministry. While in Agua Prieta, we visited Cafe Justo, a fair trade coffee cooperative, which partners with Frontera de Cristo; Cafe Justo was created as an alternative for coffee migration for coffee farmers in Southern Mexico (read more at www.justcoffee.org). We had the opportunity to hear stories of their coffee farmers, watch the roasting of coffee, and taste many delicious cups of coffee. One way that Cafe Justo supports local coffee farmers is



by churches, organizations, and individuals in the US buying their coffee at a fair price. During the week of March 17-21, Abba Java will serve Cafe Justo coffee. If you would like to order a pound (or two!) of coffee for yourself (\$12/pound), please contact Pastor Sarah by February 23.

Urukundo School Grows

There are few options for our 6^{th-} grade graduates. If you have money, your kids go to boarding school. With no money, you might attend three years of public school, grades 7-9, which are not good academically or, you finish your education at 12-13 yrs old. Yes, at 12 years old. Our strategic plan has included building classrooms for grades 7-9 so more kids can live at home and continue their education. Land is being prepared with the goal of opening in September of 2025! To achieve this goal, funds continue to be raised for construction of classrooms, bathroom facilities, water tank, desks, textbooks, and all that is needed to successfully open.
